The importance of Herman Kahn for cities and towns in America is his thought process. As a Futurist, he created and evaluated strategies that addressed incredibly serious issues, like thermonuclear war. He is credited with being the originator of scenario planning; a technique refined and employed to analyze contemporary issues by Peter Schwartz. He became known for analyzing the likely consequences of <u>nuclear war</u> and recommending ways to improve survivability, making him one of three historical inspirations for the title character of <u>Stanley Kubrick</u>'s classic <u>black comedy</u> film satire <u>Dr.</u> <u>Strangelove</u>.[11]

His theories contributed heavily to the development of the <u>nuclear strategy</u> of the <u>United States</u>.
