The Issue.

Plastics have enriched us all, consumers, producers and service providers. Like all good things, too much is too much; and that may be where we are with plastics. Cities are taking action, as shown below.

The Pacific Ocean sumps are the most dramatic evidence of our abuse of plastics and their disposal. Local beaches, rivers and lakes suffer likewise as do landfills and littered roadside rights-of-ways.



Recycling is growing. The US EPA found that in 2014 about 258 million tons of Municipal solid waste [MSW] were generated. More than 89 million tons of MSW were recycled and composted, equivalent to a 34.6 percent recycling rate. But programs beyond recycling are needed, as shown below.

The following pages offer a wide range of mitigation and collection programs directed at plastic waste. Large states, New York, and small cities, Iowa City, are taking the challenge seriously. Recently, Florida's Governor, Ron DeSantis, as reported in the Orlando Sentinel...

"last month vetoed a bill, embraced by his own party, that would have prevented cities and counties from banning plastic straws until 2024. In an encouraging veto message, DeSantis noted that such decisions are best left to locals. Previous legislatures and governors have foolishly stopped locals from regulating single-use plastic grocery bags and foam cups."

Recommended Municipal Actions.

- 1. Cities of any size can take actions to reduce pollution related to plastic bags, food and drink containers.
- 2. There are many cities, states and private/public entities taking action. Mentors and partners are readily available.
- 3. Actions are cumulative; do something, others will follow.

WHATEVER FLOATS YOUR GHOST

How to collect 40 tons of plastic trash from the ocean in a month

Ghost nets are a big problem, partly because they are continually being found in the oceans where they were never anticipated. Ephrat Livni's reporting describes the use of disposable GPS trackers employed by volunteer mariners traveling the oceans to find these abandoned nets that are subsequently collected for proper disposal:

"Ghost nets are among the greatest killers in our oceans, and not only because of their numbers. Literally hundreds of kilometers of nets get lost every year and due to the nature of the materials used to produce these nets they can and will keep fishing for multiple decades, possibly even for several centuries." https://mission-blue.org/2013/05/ghost-nets-among-the-greatest-killers-in-our-oceans/

"The Great Pacific Garbage Patch lies halfway between Hawaii and California. The shifting mass of trash covers an estimated surface area of about 618,000 sq miles (1.6 million sq km), about twice the size of Texas or three times the size of France. Ocean Voyages distributed reusable GPS trackers to mariners over the last year, asking them to leave the devices with ghost nets they encounter. When the institute's vessel took to the waters last month, the crew tracked their devices. They were able to collect the nets, their reusable tech, and other plastics found en route."
