Teach Yourself Sociology.



Sociology is an incredibly important discipline in and of itself, but it is an especially important allied profession for the urban planner. *Teach Yourself Sociology* is a title that could be denigrating to the profession since it is really not a teach yourself subject; however, this book gives great overview information, a solid foundation into the history and precepts of the discipline and a useful language. This book is a great place to start to appreciate the importance of sociology and its direct application to the issues and opportunities afforded cities as they plan their future.

The authors first chapter is so elucidating that what might be considered a "long pull" goes quickly from the origins of sociology to the three revolutions that brought it to the for:

- The scientific revolution of Kepler, Galileo and Newton,
- The political and social revolution of Locke and Voltaire, and
- The industrial revolution [1750-1850]. "This
 provided the impetus for sociology by
 creating dramatic social and economic
 change on one hand, and also by creating
 the belief that it was possible to achieve
 control over forces that had previously
 seemed completely beyond the power of
 humanity." [p4]

The first chapter alone is sufficient to create a fundamental understanding of the subject and spark in interest in reading on.
